THE KYLE FAMILY

Our branch of the Kyle Clan descends from John Kyle, born in Ireland about 1770, emigrated to America when sixteen years of age. John settled in Virginia where Rockingham Co. records show marriage bonds issued for John Kyle and Margaret Beard, daughter of J.son Beard on 25 July 1791. Testets were James Beard, Mary Beard, and William Kyle.

Research finds John Kyle in Virginia land records and tax rolls of Greenbrier County 1798-1813 (on land of the "Waters of Meadows River"), Monroe County 1814-1835, and Nicholas Co. 1836-1848. The first Virginia mortality records list John, Nicholas Co. 1850--78 years of age. He was a teacher of note--listed as a public school teacher, Monroe Co. before 1830. (Ref: Virginia State Historical Society, Richmond, Va.) 1828-30 he was at Carpenters Run, Monroe Co. It is purported that he was still teaching at age 75. Some of his descendants say he was known as the singing schoolteacher.

Margaret Kyle, age 80, appeared as head of household of the 1850 Census Nicholas Co., Va. In 1860, at age 90, she was listed in the household of Andrew Kyle, farmer age 30--who in 1850 at age 21 was a member of Margaret's household. An entry in our family Bible states that GRANDMOTHER KYLE DIED 13 JUNE AT AGE 94. A ten-year search has not revealed WHERE she died nor PLACE OF BURIAL. The 9 known children of John and Margaret Kyle were Charlotte, b. 1799--m. John Charlton 1821; John, Jr., b. 1802--m. Nancy Hanna 1825, Magdalen Neff 1866; Charles, b.1803--m. Catherine Vance 1824, Zelina Ristine 1868; Margaret--m. William Cart 1821; Sarah--m. John Boyd 1826; Virginia, b. 1810; Elizabeth, b. 1813; Nancy, b. 1815; Robert, b. 1818--m. Frances Boggs-Hughes. Other children may have been William--m. Celina Craig 1817; and Thomas--m.

1825.

CHARLES KYLE, born 14 Feb. 1803 near Lewisburg, Greenbriar Co., Va., was married 19 March 1824, Monroe Co., Va., to Catharine Vance, born 5 Feb 1802

Monroe Co. Va. Jacob Vance (Vantz) signed the bans. In the fall of 1835, the family (5 children) moved to Indiana. In 1843 they settled permanently on their farm, Jefferson Co., Iowa. Charles and Catharine had 9 children, 5 eldest born in Va.: John Jackson, b. 1825, Warren, Albemarle Co., Va.; d. 1907; Henry B., 1826-1838; Chas. A., 1828-1901; Rufus, 1830-1837; Elizabeth May, 1832-1919; Martha Anne, 1835-1858; William Butler, 1837-1924; Ira Cass, 1840-1916; Cephas T., 1843-1909. Catharine died 7 Feb. 1860. Charles Kyle d. 6 Oct. 1871.

IRA CASS KYLE, b. 16 July 1840, Logansport, Cass Co., Ind., and Sarah "Sade" Chilcott, b. 26 Dec. 1844, Huntingdon, Pa., were married 1866, Salina, Iowa. Ira was a photographer, farmer, judge, and Civil War veteran. Ira and "Sade" had 3 children: Bernice, b. 1867, m. Oscar N. Quick; Grace, b. 1871; and Ira Winfred. Ira, "Sade," and daughters came by covered wagon to Ks. where they homesteaded 1872 near Mankato, Jewell Co., Ks. "Sade" died 1905; Ira, 1916.

IRA WINFRED "Wint" KYLE, born 30 July 1876 on the Kyle homestead was married 8 Nov. 1911, Mankato, Ks., to Fairmine A. Harness b. 15 June 1876, Van Buren Co, Ia. "Wint" and "Fairy" were Mankato High School classmates graduating ca.1897. She was the only girl in the class. They later operated a dairy farm. "Fairy" died 29 Dec. 1938, Topeka, Ks.; "Wint" 27 Aug. 1954, Colby, Ks. There are 2 children: Marjorie and Byron. Marjorie Fairmine b. 10 Sept. 1914, m. 1932 to George A. Nichols 1908-1978. Their 7 children are: Burton, Barbara, Dwayne, Kathleen, Franklin, Byron George, and Margaret.

BYRON WINFRED KYLE, b. 21 Sept 1916, married 21 Sept 1938 to Anona Maxine Lindblad, b. 23 Mar 1917. Their 2 children are Marcia and Dana. (Fairle) Marcia, b. 15 June 1941, Kyle homestead, on her grandmother Kyle's birthday, m. 25 June 1966 to Richard Bennett Rinehart, b. 5 Oct 1938. Three children: Sheridan Elise, Kyle Bennett, Matthew Richard.

DANA BYRON KYLE, b. 24 Dec. 1948, m. April 1968 to Ada Sue Potter, b. 13 Dec 1948. Two sons: Joshua Dana and Giles Byron--the 7th American generation in the John Kyle line bearing the Kyle name.

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FROM NOTES OF IRA KYLE, GRANDSON OF CHARLES KYLE:
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We find Charles KYLE listed as son of "John"-was he John Matthew?
Matthew KYLE was educated to be a Catholic Priest, but before he was ordained; the family moved to the "New World," settling in Virginia.

In research of Virginia, the first record of John KYLE is his marriage 25, July, 1791 to Margaret BEARD in Rockingham county, VA. Rockingham had been created from Augusta in 1778, and many of it's records can be obtained from Augusta county records by Chalkley. Thus in Chalkley's records of Volume II, page 25, we find:

"Donaghe vs. John Kyle, of Rockingham, heir-at law of William Kyle, deceased-Writ to Rockingham, 31st July,1797. Plea in abatement shows that William Kyle left two elder brothers, then living in Ireland, the eldest named Charles and the second named James, who were both alive when the defendant came from Ireland, which was several years after death of William, brother of defendant. William died about 1781. Bond by William Kyle, James Blair and James Donago, all of Augusta county to James Todd, of Macklenburg, North Carolina, 2nd Aug,1778. The bond is headed State of North Carolina."

From the above reference we can deduct that the KYLE brothers were:

The court record of Chalkley causes me to wonder who William Kyle of Augusta is in relation to John. We find a William Kyle, age 84 in the 1790 VA. census, _______ county. Could this be an Uncle? If he were John's fahher, he would be an heir-at-law of the deceased William, or perhaps he is the Grandfather?



After working there for two years, he was transferred in 1944 to Camp Pickett, now Fort Pickett, in Blackstone, VA., where he worked until it closed in 1951. He was foreman in the machine shop and was cited as a very valuable and capable man. Chester and Sue purchased a home on Rt. 2, Chase City, VA., in 1943 where they reared and educated their four children.

Sue worked as a seamstress in her home so that she could care for her own children plus several orphan children, selecting work which would permit her to be near the children. Sue still has a warm spot in her heart for those children who return to Sue's and call it home.

Chester died in 1973. Sue still lives on their little 35 acre farm Rt. 2, Chase City, VA. She has a garden each year and cans and freezes her food. 

The William Kyle Residence

The accompanying picture is of a residence built in 1877 and occupied by the late Mr. and Mrs. William Kyle near Enoch. The tworoom house was built almost entirely of logs. The room on the left was built of sawed logs and a sawed log floor. The room on the right was built of hewed logs including a hewed log floor. This house included a full-length porch and was covered with clapboards. The chimney was built of cut stone and had two huge fireplaces, which burned wood, perhaps four feet long. There was no door in the partition between the two rooms. When one wished to go from one room to the other, it was necessary to go out onto the porch, then through an outside door into the other room.

At the time it was built, this house was a modern residence. That is a reminder that there is great change with the passing of time. Moreover, that change is a basic law of life. Further, thinking people would not have it to be otherwise even if they could. Mr. and Mrs. Kyle spent their declining years in this house. Mrs. Kyle passed on in 1905 and Mr. Kyle about twenty years later. Mrs. Jane Kyle was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ezekiel Holcomb, Sr.

The late Ed Rhodes' widow is Mr. and Mrs. Kyle's daughter. Mrs. Deby Rhodes was five years old when her father built this house. Despite her age, she, with the assistance of her daughter, Mrs.

Marie Briton, owns and operates as store near Cressmont. Because of the fact that most women do not relish the idea of other people knowing their age, I hesitated to give data which would indicate Mrs. Rhodes' age. While I was debating the pro's and con's on the chance I would be taking in giving the above data, I recalled having heard Mrs. Rhodes state something in church in the presence of a large audience, about six months ago, which indicated her age. Therefore, I concluded that I would not be endangering my life by stating the facts set out in paragraphs one and two above.

Mrs. Rhodes reared a family of nine children. All except two, are living. She was very, very eager for her children to acquire an education. She had children in high school continuously from the early twenty's to the early thirty's. At a time when not many people in this section was much interested in education. Most of Mrs. Rhodes' younger children graduated at Clay High School. A son, B. H. (Hank) attended Morris Harvey College and taught ten years in the Clay County schools. Another son, Jay D. was manager of The Elk River Coal & Lumber Company's Swandale store at the time of his death in April 1950. Mrs. Rhodes' two living daughters, Mrs. Jane Hamsted and Mrs. Marie Briton are registered nurses.


The late Robert L., Mark, John R. and Roland Kyle were sons o Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Kyle. The lat Allen Rhodes' widow is also thei daughter. They had another daughter whose name I do not recall and who probably is still living.

A part of the Wm. Kyle farm a the head of Dog Run is now owner by Ted Kyle, a son of the lat John R. Kyle and a grandson o the late Wm. Kyle. Ted built tw modern dwellings on his farm, h and his wife occupy one. The othe is occupied by his mother, Mr. Lizzie Kyle. Luke Rhodes, a son (Mr. and Mrs. Ed Rhodes, also owr a part of the Kyle homestea Luke recently built a modern cor crete block barn on his farm her (Perhaps I shall have something say about Luke's knack for build ing before long in my Reminiscence series).



William KYLE 1928

William KYLE was born on Whitewater Creek, Nicholas county, in what was then the state of Virginia; on November 14, 1847, and was over 80 years of age at the time of his death on January 6th, 1928. His parents, Robert and Frances KYLE, moved to the headwaters of Buffalo when he was very young and settled on the farm where Enoch Postoffice is now located. Here he grew to young manhood.

He enlisted at the age of seventeen in Captain B.L. STEPHENSON'S Company of "Home Guards", located at Clay Court House, during the last year of the Civil War.Soon after his discharge from the service, he married Miss Jane HOLCOMB, daughter of Ezekial HOLCOMB, who with his son, James, died during the war in a Confederate Prison (Libby Prison at Richmond, VA.), having been captured with a number of Captain RAMSEY'S Company by a detachment of Confederate Raiders.

After his marriage, Mr. KYLE settled not far from what is now Lizemores but remained there only a few years, returning to the farm where his father had died and where William remained for the rest of his life, purchasing the interest of the other heirs in the farm and rearing his family there.

After the death of his wife, which occured almost six years ago, Mr. KYLE spent much of his residence at the old home which he had rented in order that he might have someone to look after the Post-Office in his absence. But the urge to return to the home where nearly all his life had been spent, where his children had grown up, and where the companion of his youth had died; was so strong that he could not resist the call, and he made frequent trips back for a stay of a few days at frequent intervals.

Following one of these visits, he had gone to the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. RHODES, at Cressmont, where two days after his arrival, he quietly passed away on the evening of January 6th, 1928, at the ripe old age of eighty years, one month, and twenty one days.

He leaves three sons and two daughters as follows: John R. KYLE of Cressmont, Mark C.KYLE, of Charleston, Roland S.KYLE of Teays, Mrs. E. RHODES and Mrs. Allen RHODES of Cressmont. Three sons and one daughter preceded him to the Great Beyond, two of them dying in infancy.

Mr. KYLE at an early age affliated himself with Methodist Episcopal Church, and served as class leader most of his life. For several years when there was no available building in the neighborhood that could be used for the purpose of holding religious services, his home was used for this purpose; the circuit Elder preaching there regurlarly on his rounds and a number of Revival services being conducted in the home where the people of the neighborhood gathered for that purpose, these services sometimes lasting for two or three weeks.

In the early days when ministers were scarce in the rural sections and when undertakers had not been heard of, he was usually one of the first in the homes where death had paid it's unwelcome visit; always ready to lend assistance in the matter of making the necessary arrangements for the burial of the deceased; to give whatever consolation he could to the bereaved, and to do whatever else he could to assist in the trying ordeal.

When on March 1, the grim monster, death; removed Mrs. Jane KYLE of Enoch, WVA, from that neighborhood, the vicinity suffered a great loss. The writer of this having known her for 47 years. She was a neighbor to my mother and she was a neighbor in it's truest sense, a Biblical neighbor. Visited the sick, cared for the poor, and adopted homeless children. I have known her to take consumptives in her own home and provided them with food and shelter until death releived them.

She was 79 years old and the wife of William KYLE. Her maiden name was HOLCOMB. She was the mother of nine children, four of them having preceded her to the Great Beyond. Tryans and Theodore died in infancy and Rosie and Robert reached womanhood and manhood. The husband and following children survive: John KYLE of Enoch, Mrs. Deby RHODES and Mrs. Rachel RHODES of Cressmont, Roland KYLE of Clendenin, and M.C. KYLE of Charleston.

She raised an honorable family, as all who know them will testify. She toiled to support her family, but her toils were not in vain. She professed faith in Christ when young, and affiliated with the M.E. Church and lived a consistent Christian life and lived with full assurance that she was going home to live with Jesus, and her children who had preceded her to the Glory Land; and today her spirit is looking down from Heaven with guardian ears over her five children and bereft husband who are still in the flesh.

"RECOLLECTIONS OF AN OLD MAN" By William KYLE

Senn of Robert and Frances (HUGHES) KYLE.

A son of one of the pioneers of Buffalo District , Clay County, WV. relates a few reminiscenses dealing with the early history of that part of Clay County.

My father moved here in the year 1842, to what was then Nicholas co., Virginia. Only a few families lived in this section at that time and their cabins were scattered over a large territory. The county was a wilderness without roads, churches, schools, houses or stores.

My father built his cabin near the Walnut Knob. Our nearest neighbor was Strother Grose, about a mile from our cabin and on the farm now owned by Lanty Adkins. Our next neighbor was Uncle James Young, father of B.L. Young and Mrs. Missouri Stephenson of Clay. His cabin was about one mile and a half miles from ours and on the farm owned by R.R.Thomas. About two miles farther to the east, lived Josiah Hamrick, who later moved to the well known Hamrick farm on Mount Pisgah. His former home was on the farm now owned by Jonathan Dalton.

Our next neighbor was James HOLCOMB, father of W.H. HOLCOMB, on the farm now owned and occupied by John Meadows, and a half miles farther on lived Avis Renick on the farm now owned by James McGraw. The cabin stood near the low gap near the farm now owned by Thomas Scott. About a mile to the north lived Abner Ramsey on the farm now owned by his daughter, Mrs. Mary E. Hamrick. A little to the west and about one and one-half miles from our cabin lived Elisha Fitzwater, and about three miles from our place and near the mouth of the Robinson Fork of Buffalo, lived William HUGHES. He began the erection of a grist mill near his home, but never finished it.

About this time William Hamrick moved to the place where the town of Swandale now stands and built a mill where we got our corn ground. When a small boy, I used to go there to mill. The path was very narrow and sometimes the horses would run against a snag and tear a hole in the sack and waste a part of my grist. If the hole was not too large, I would stop it with leaves and go on again.

Three miles from us, Elisha Grose built a cabin and stayed for a short time on the farm now owned by Morgan Blankenship. This, I believe, about covers all the first settlers of the neighborhood now known as Enoch. We did not have a Post Office for many years later and as I have said, there was not a church or school house in the settlement; but the Sabbath was far more sacredly observed than it is today.

Here, as in many new settlements, the itinerant Methodist Preacher followed soon and preached from house to house to attentive congregationsStrother B. Grose kept his door open for a house of worship. Among the early preachers was Grandfather Joel Hamrick, the Greatgrandfather of the Hamricks in the counties of Clay, Braxton and Webster. I remember when I was a small boy he used to love to sing "We are going home to die no more." Some of the other preachers were Brooks Hindman, Phelps Totton, James Connor and R.V.Sanford. They have all long since gone over the river, and strange to say, the old log house where they preached is still standing. It was the birthplace of James M. Grose, formerly a resident of Clay
