Passing the Torch (notebooks)

Several months ago, I began passing on some of the 3-ring binders of family research that I have been working on for over 30 years. My kids (in their 50s) have always enjoyed hearing family stories but have no room in their homes for the 20+ notebooks of research about people they never heard of. So far, I have donated 2 notebooks to the Nicholas county, Kentucky, Genealogical Society and one to the Miner county, South Dakota Genealogical Society. I contacted each society in advance and asked if they would like to have the information. I visited both societies in the past and found information about my family which had been donated by others researching the same area. They were happy to add the notebooks to their genealogy collection.

My parents were the oldest children in their families. I am the oldest of 10 grandchildren on Dad's side and 12 on Mom's. I asked my cousin Nancy if she would like to have the Wiley notebook, which contained birth, marriage and death certificates as well as photos of her mom and aunts and uncles as children. She was excited to have this family heirloom.

Grandma Laura Chesney married Grandpa Verne Wiley at the insistence of her father. Grandma loved another young man, John Smith, but her father didn't feel John was an acceptable suitor because he was "just a farmer." I remember Gram talking about John Smith all her life. Verne was considered a better match because he was an

electrician and had a better financial future.

Grandma and Grandpa had five children. Mom was the oldest with two brothers and two sisters. Gordon, the youngest child, died in 1939 at 10 months of whooping cough and pneumonia.

In August my daughter, Beth, granddaughter Eilise and I flew to Wisconsin for a long weekend. We visited my hometown (Whitewater), as well as the town where my two kids were born (Burlington) and spent time with family members in other towns. On our last day we got together with Nancy and the Wiley

cousins. I gave them the notebook and told them some of the old family stories I remembered. In addition to birth, marriage and death certificates there were many old newspaper articles I had collected over the years.

Whitewater, Wisconsin, is a university town and its local library has an online collection of local newspaper from 1850 - 2019. The newspaper is searchable, and I have found many interesting stories about family members. Some were happy (weddings, births, and graduations). and some quite Others were sad shocking. They had never heard the story of a distant cousin who murdered his two uncles on their remote farm and stole the small of cash they had hidden in a strongbox.

Whitewater Register, March 23, 1950 Tom Chesney Confesses Axe Murder of His Uncles; Horrible Crime Committed to Get \$300

A shocking double axe murder was solved Wednesday afternoon when Tom Chesney confessed to Rock County Sheriff Sweeney. Chesney told how he murdered Pat and John Fanning at their secluded farm home Saturday morning. The crime was discovered Monday morning by a bread truck driver. By evening Chesney was suspected but absent.

Chesney, a nondescript farm hand who lived a catch-as-catch-can life in this vicinity, caught a bus to Lima Friday evening to visit his elderly uncles. He went to the barn with Pat and killed him with an axe. Then he returned to the house and murdered John on the porch, leaving the bodies where they fell. Chesney ransacked the house for money, finding approximately \$300 in a strong box. The murderer then walked to Whitewater Lake Inn where he called the Courtesy Cab for a ride to town. The driver noticed he carried a large amount of paper money.

Chesney made the rounds of taverns Saturday and spent the day shopping and paying bills. He purchased a used car and spent the evening in Madison. He drank steadily in Whitewater Sunday and Monday morning after quitting his job at La Grange where he worked as a farm hand.

The investigation was aided by Chief Asbury and his men who traced the taxi ride, his free spending and a bloody coat sent to Pleez-U Cleaners.

Chesney was as clumsy as a criminal could be. His reputation cast suspicion on him first and his possession of money was a novelty appreciated by those who had loaned him funds. He made little effort to cover his tracks or be halfway subtle in his actions following the crime.

The resources include indexes to county cemeteries, marriages, and obituaries. Click the plus sign to the right of the database title to access the alphabetical index. The data fields for the obituary index include full name, maiden name, age, date of death, date of birth, parents, spouse, newspaper title, date of publication, and page number. Scroll across to view all of the Instructions for searching the fields. indexes have been provided.
